Older People Denied Proper Access to Cancer Care A new editorial in the British Medical Journal claims that older people globally are being denied proper access to cancer care. The author, Professor Mark Lawler of Queens University, cites <u>triple negative breast cancer</u> in older w omen as one example of an age disparity, stating that older w omen with the disease receive less chemotherapy than their younger counterparts despite evidence of the treatment's efficacy in this patient cohort. <u>Medical Xpress</u> covers the editorial.

Investigating Patients at Higher Risk of Cardiotoxicity

Medical Xpress discusses work being done at UConn Health to address the health risks that sometimes come after beating cancer. Researchers point out how chemotherapy and radiation both put patients at a higher risk of developing heart disease, including heart failure. These researchers are working to identify those patients w ho are at a high risk for developing cardiotoxicity so that they can be monitored more closely over time and offered cardioprotective treatment, if necessary.

Cancer to Become Leading Cause of Death in U.S.

According to a new report from the American Society of Clinical Oncology, in 16 years, cancer will become the leading cause of death in the United States, surpassing heart disease. The number of new cancer cases is expected to increase nearly 45 percent by 2030, from 1.6 million cases to 2.3 million cases annually. The report also found a need for more cancer doctors, show ing that private oncology practices are becoming less sustainable, and as local practices close, patients are paying more and traveling farther for quality cancer care. <u>CNN</u> covers the report.

New Test Could Lead to More Personalized Treatment

A new study led by researchers in Nottingham has developed a new clinical test which measures 10 proteins (biomarkers) found in breast cancer cells, giving researchers detailed information about a patient's breast cancer type and its likely behavior, which could help doctors make more effective and personalized treatment decisions. <u>Medical Xpress</u> covers the study.

Vitamin D Associated with Increased Survival

New research published in *Anticancer Research* has found that breast cancer patients who had high levels of vitamin D were twice as likely to survive as women with low levels. Authors say that the study has implications for including <u>vitamin D</u> as an adjuvant to conventional breast cancer therapy. <u>TIME</u> reports on the study.

7-Tesla MRI Could Be Used for Breast Cancer Diagnosis in

A recent study out of Austria has found that 7-Tesla ultra-highfield magnetic resonance imaging (MRI) can be used for clinical applications in patients with breast tumors. This method could be used in the future to even more accurately diagnose breast cancer. <u>Medical Xpress</u> covers the study.

Genetic Profiling Method Could Identify Those at Risk of Recurrence

Findings presented at the Miami Breast Cancer Conference have found that molecular <u>subtyping</u> can help doctors better determine which of their breast cancer patients are at high risk of breast cancer recurrence. This method of <u>genetic profiling</u> offers an additional resource to help identify patients who would most benefit from chemotherapy.<u>Science Codex</u> reports on the study.

New Drug Delivery System May lead to Reduced Side Effects

According to <u>Medical Xpress</u>, a new study aims to reduce side effects by delivering medication directly through the milk ducts, which will provide larger doses of the drug(s) to affected tissues. An estimated 65,000 w omen in 2013 w ere diagnosed with carcinoma in situ, a noninvasive breast cancer affecting the milk ducts. Delivering drugs directly through the milk ducts may reduce side effects from medication that normally travels through the bloodstream. More research is needed to confirm the results.

New Breath Test May Detect Breast Cancer

Reuters reports that a new six-minute breath test identified w omen with early stage breast cancer or an abnormal mammogram screening. The study, published in the scientific journal *PLOS ONE*, show ed abnormal volatile chemicals in the breath of w omen with breast cancer. Overall breath test accuracy for breast cancer diagnosis w as roughly 80 percent. Screening breath tests for breast cancer are experimental and more research is needed.

New Online Survivor Support System

Medical Xpress reports on an innovative new service which will offer cancer survivors an online social support system and encourage individuals to find "exercise buddies," improving physical well-being and overall **quality of life** after treatment.

Oral Chemotherapy Parity Bill

Good News for cancer patients! Senate Bill 99—the Cancer Treatment Modernization bill—w as passed by the Senate, with only one "nay" vote by Senator Kris Jordan of Delaw are. The bill will now go to the Ohio House of Representatives committee, and then hopefully be referred to the floor for a vote. We want to thank Kris Gaston and Barb DePalma for sharing their stories in this process!

SB 99 would ensure that cancer patients are not disadvantaged if the best course of treatment recommended by the physician is oral chemotherapy treatment. SB 99 just passed out of committee. Need for Clarity around BSA

NBC News discusses a new study published in *Obstetrics & Gynecology* which suggests that messages associated with "breast self-aw areness" are unclear and may be confusing for w omen – many of w hom still believe monthly breast self-examination to be a recommended practice. Komen's managing director of health and program education Susan Brown spoke on the issue, sharing that Komen urges w omen to know the signs and symptoms of breast cancer, to know their own family history and risk, to be screened appropriately and to make healthy lifestyle choices.
