Why Breast Health Belongs in the Congregation

- Gather the community with safety and comfort
- Women educated in a group are motivated to make screening a priority
- Congregations are sources of support for families
- No cost screenings and treatment options exist locally but women don't know about them
- African American women in Franklin County die from breast cancer 40% more than other groups
- Rural and Appalachian counties experience barriers to breast cancer care, but can be connected to assistance
